HERE'S WHAT TO KNOW ABOUT YOUR SEWER LINE



o you know what happens to that dirty water after it goes down the toilet or drain? It becomes wastewater and it travels through miles of underground pipes to one of Kansas City's six wastewater treatment plants.

Most of the time, plumbing and sewers are out of sight and out of mind. KC Water works to keep the system moving by cleaning, maintaining, and repairing City sewer mains.

But if a problem happens, location matters. The customer is responsible for the pipe that runs from the home or business to the point of connection to the city sewer main. That responsibility includes maintenance and repairs.

If a sewer backup or blockage happens, KC Water recommendations include:

• Call 311 to request that KC Water inspect and, as necessary, clean the City sewer line serving your home.

• If the blockage persists, the customer's plumber should call KC Water Investigations and Inspections at 816-513-4810 to schedule an appointment to verify the location of the blockage. We will advise the plumber to try to open the blockage; and/or to utilize a closed circuit television camera to identify the problem.

Sewer line repair can be costly. If your homeowners' policy does not cover pipeline repairs (these policies typically do not), consider additional coverage. Ask your insurance agent or homeowners' insurance company; or conduct an internet search for "sewer line insurance," "water line insurance," or "service line insurance." Compare options to get the best deal.

An easy way to avoid costly sewer backups is to never pour fats, oils, and grease (FOG) in the sink or down a drain. FOG sticks to the inside of pipes and wreaks havoc on your plumbing and our sewer system. Learn more in our new, animated video at <u>www.youtube.com/kcmowater</u>.
